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PROGRAM NOTES

With Quiet Courage was written in loving memory of the composer's mother, Lois Daehn. "Her life was heroic, but without fanfare. / She worked and hoped and inspired. / She loved and was loved. / Her life was a noble song of quiet courage." This piece was premiered by the U.S. Navy Band in September, 1995.

Dawn Of A New Day, commissioned by the Ohio Band Directors was composed in the winter of 1991. Conceived as a descriptive work, the composition literally depicts the composer's thoughts of a typical work day in an urban setting. The opening fanfare paints a musical portrait of a magnificent sunrise that is best described as being both stunning and radiant. What follows is a series of mood changes intended to allow the listener to use his or her imagination and ultimately share with the composer the enjoyment of the creative process. - Notes by composer

In Perfect Silence, I Often Gaze At The New Stars -

"As I was writing this piece, I found myself becoming very emotional as I realized time and time against that I would never (and never could) understand the pain and hardship the residents of Joplin, Missouri must have felt as tornados devastated their city on that Sunday afternoon in May of 2011.

To their director, Rick Castor and to the band members and their parents, as well as to the faculty and administration of Joplin High School, I will be forever indebted to you for asking me to write this piece "In Perfect Silence..." It is meant as a musical tribute to those who lost their lives in this horrific tragedy as well as to those heroes who gave everything they could to help others, including their own lives." - Notes by composer

The Machine Awakes is the sound of something not human (but of human hands); something not entirely organic, but most definitely alive - waking for the first time. From the opening swirling textures, we sense the first hesitant sparks of thought, attempting to find form and coherence. This new machine - sentient, aware - comes fully awake, possessed of emphatic self-determination and unfathomable purpose. - Notes by composer



PROGRAM NOTES (Cont.)

Nessun Dorma ("None Shall Sleep") from Turandot

Puccini was one of the most successful operatic composers in history. Almost all of his operas were popular. His operas were infused with drama, and they took place almost anywhere but his native Italy: France, Spain, Japan, America, and... China, the locale of Turandot.

The Chinese Princess, Turandot, is a beautiful but cold and heartless woman. She has had many suitors, but has accepted none. They all had to pass a test consisting of three riddles. They all failed and were beheaded. A new young suitor, a prince named Calàf appears incognito. He correctly answers all the riddles, but Turandot still refuses to marry him. He gives her one out; if she discovers his real name before dawn, he will be willing to die. In her efforts to discover his name, she decrees that no one in the realm should sleep that night (nessun dorma). All must devote themselves to discovering his name. The prince repeats Turandot's order, "No man shall sleep!" and vows that his name will not be discovered until he kisses her at daybreak.

Minimalist Dances was written as kind of a challenge for myself; I wanted to see how much musical interest could be generated from only a very small amount of source material. The first section relies almost exclusively on syncopated rhythmic layering to create the texture. The middle dance utilizes a single accompanying rhythm with insistent melodies above very limited harmonies. The final dance is a bit tongue-in-cheek reference to how "minimalist' pop music can be; the standard '50s Progression' in a minor key provides the entire harmonic basis for the finale of the work. More than anything else Minimalist Dances was written to provide an engaging playing and listening experience through musical textures more than melodies.
